

I would like to start this article by thanking everyone who attended and participated in the National Bowling Tournament in Buffalo, New York. Participation was up this year over the last couple of years and that made for some great competition and camaraderie. I want to thank all those who made the tournament possible this year, they did an outstanding job!

I originally had a different topic for this issue, however, as I write this, world events have taken center stage. As your representative of the order for the world, I would be remiss if I didn't address the current events going on in the northeastern parts of Nigeria.

Of course I am speaking about the kidnapping of approximately 300 school girls by the terrorist group Boko Haram. All of our thoughts and prayers are with those girls and we hope for a swift and peaceful resolution to this situation. This act of violence against Christians only supports the growing worldwide marginalization of those who believe that Jesus Christ is our Lord and Savior. Many people in the United States and many parts of the world do not believe that there are certain moral absolutes that have withstood the test of time. They believe in moral relativism. That is, what may have been immoral some time ago is now moral because society, as a whole, has accepted that action or idea. I am here to testify that there are certain moral absolutes; that good and evil do exist and nothing can change those absolutes. This kidnapping is a truly evil and despicable act. We can only pray for the return of all of these girls safely and soundly.

The only exception to our car pooling was on Holy Days of Obligation, when Matt and I, along with my mother, went to an early Mass, return to her house for breakfast, before going into work a little late.

It was Mattio who asked me to join the Knights of Columbus. Convinced by him, I joined, received my third and fourth degrees. By then Mattio had left the K of C. (Little did I know that he was involved in organizing a Knights of St. John Commandery and would be their Charter President).

Shortly after, Mattio approached me and asked if I had ever heard of the Nocturnal Adoration Society. Would I like to join? He convinced me and before you knew it, I was a band leader and President of the local group. Mattio left and went on to other things.

Mattio on another mission, tells me about this Jesuit Retreat House that he and a group of men from his parish go to for a weekend, every year. Sounds good to me and I joined the group. It was everything he said it was. A great spiritual experience for me. Over the course of 10-15 years, the attendance from our group diminished. Supreme Secretariat:

The Supreme Secretariat will consist of the Supreme Secretary and three (3) Under Secretaries. The three Under Secretary/Quartermaster, the Under Secretary/Quartermaster, the Under Secretary/Rituals. The Under Secretary/Rituals. The Under Secretary/Rituals. The Under Secretary (Quartermaster, Journal and Ritual) will be appointed by the Supreme President after the Supreme International Convention for a term of two years or until a successor is appointed. By nature of his duties and responsibility, the Under Secretaries will have the rank of Brigadier General.

The Supreme Under Secretary/ Quartermaster will be responsible for all materials held by the Supreme Commandery for sale to Grand, District or Local Commanderies. He will keep an inventory of all materials on hand. He will keep track of all material sold and forward monies to the Supreme Treasurer. He will re-order inventory as required to ensure needed items are on-hand. He will work in conjunction with the Under Secretary/Rituals to provide Grand Commanderies with ritual inventory required.

The Supreme Under Secretary/Journal (Assistant Editor, KSJI Journal) will assist he Supreme Secretary in the creation, editing and distribution of the Knights of St. John International Journal. He will be responsible for the collection of information from all Grand Commanderies. He will edit the material and assemble it for the printer. He will maintain the address list of Journal recipients and arrange for the mail or e-mail of the Journal to all members.

The Supreme Under Secretary/Rituals (Assistant Supreme Ritual Director) will assist the Supreme Secretary in the exemplification of Rituals by all Grand Commanderies. He will coordinate all ritual efforts and will be responsible for maintaining the rituals and associated documents. He will work with the Quartermaster General to maintain inventory for the rituals and will keep a record of all rituals held and all members receiving degrees.

# Chapter II, Supreme Commandery, DUTIES OF OFFICER

Insert after Section 20

Section 20.5

The Supreme Inspector General shall be responsible for the Military efforts of the Supreme Commandery. His duties shall include:

a.) He shall call for a yearly inspection and muster of each Grand Commandery, at the order of the Supreme President, to be held in the Fall of the year. The order shall be published in the Knights of St. John Journal. He

shall provide reporting forms to each Grand Commandery and collect the information from said Grands. He shall produce a report to the Supreme Commandery showing the results of the Inspection and Muster of all Grand commanderies.

- b.) He shall review all Constitutional revisions and make recommendations for any changes submitted that relate to the military.
- c.) He shall be an investigative officer for the Supreme Commandery in cases of Military Dispute Resolution when so ordered by the Supreme Commandery President. Under direction of the Supreme Commandery President or designee, the office of the Supreme Inspector General will conduct an investigation to determine all facts in the matter. The Supreme Inspector General's office shall report the findings to the Supreme President for review.
- d.) He shall be the liaison with KSJI uniform suppliers and shall inspect all proposed uniforms and accessories and report to the Supreme Board. He shall assist Grand Commanderies with acquisition of uniforms and accessories.
- e.) He shall perform any other duties assigned to him by the Supreme President or designee as required.

Section 30

When issues arise with or between:

- 1. Members of the Order within a Commandery,
  - 2. Local Commanderies
  - 3. District Commanderies

- 4. Grand Commanderies
- 5. or any others,

every attempt should be made to resolve them at the lowest level and as informally as possible.

### Section 31

When disputes arise within a local Commandery, It will be the duty of the Commandery Officers to resolve the dispute as prescribed by this Constitution in the appropriate section for Local Commanderies.

However, when a dispute cannot be resolved at the Local Commandery level or a dispute arises between Local Commanderies; the dispute shall be escalated to the District or Grand Commandery, whichever is appropriate. The District or Grand Commandery President or designee shall conduct an investigation to determine all facts in the matter. The District or Grand President will have the authority to mediate between the parties and order a resolution to the dispute.

When a dispute cannot be resolved at the District Commandery level or a dispute arises between District Commanderies; the dispute shall be escalated to the Grand Commandery. The Grand Commandery President or designee shall conduct an investigation to determine all facts in the matter. The Grand Commandery President will have the authority to mediate between the parties and order a resolution to the dispute.

When a dispute cannot be resolved at the Grand Commandery level or a dispute arises between Grand Commanderies where there exists a Supreme Subordinate Commandery; the dispute shall be escalated to the Supreme Subordinate Commandery. The Supreme Subordinate Commandery President or designee shall conduct an investigation to determine all facts in the matter. The Supreme Subordinate President will have the authority to mediate between the parties and order a resolution to the dispute.

When a dispute cannot be resolved at the Grand Commandery or Supreme Subordinate Commandery level or a dispute arises between Grand Commanderies where there is no Supreme Subordinate Commandery; the dispute shall be escalated to the Supreme Commandery. The Supreme Commandery President or designee will direct the office of the Supreme Inspector General and/or the Supreme Counsel and/or a Special Committee, depending on the dispute, to conduct an investigation to determine all the facts in the matter. The investigating body (Inspector, Counsel or Committee) shall report the findings to the Supreme President for review. The Supreme President will have the authority to mediate between the parties and order a resolution to the dispute.

# Section 32

The mediation decision of the Officer in Charge at the appropriate level (Local Commandery President, Grand Commandery President, Supreme Sub-

ordinate President, or Supreme President), will be communicated to all parties involved. The decision will be binding if accepted by all parties. The decision may be appealed to a higher command if all are not in agreement. In all disputes, the order of appeal set forth above shall be followed.

When the dispute reaches the Supreme Commandery, the mediation decision of the Supreme President shall be final and binding to all parties without exception.

### Section 33

When the mediation decision of the Officer in Charge includes the recommendation of penalties, then the following shall also be followed:

The Officer in Charge may recommend reasonable penalties which may include fine, suspension or expulsion for violation of any by-law of the Local, District, Grand, Supreme Subordinate or Supreme Commandery or violation of any lawful order made, in writing, by a Supreme Officer. The OIC will present the recommendation to the Authoritative Body (Local Commandery, Grand Commandery, Supreme Subordinate Board or Supreme Board) for a vote on the recommended penalties.

Any member who is charged with any offense considered conduct unbecoming a Knight shall stand suspended until completion of the investigation and the decision of the Authoritative Body.

# Section 34

Litigation brought forth against the Knights of St. John International by any member of Local, District, Grand, or Supreme Subordinate Commandery, without following the due process outlined above, will be cause for suspension from the Order pending investigation. In all cases, the dispute resolution and appeal process set forth here shall be used by all members of the Knights of St. John International and litigation may be cause for expulsion from the Order.

# Supreme Subordinate Commandery ~ Nigeria

N140.0M (\$829,383) Two Storeyed Classroom Block at Veritas University of Nigeria Abuja. (Catholic University) Opened.

History was made at our annual presentation of reports by Church Organizations to the Catholic Bishops Conference of Nigeria on Monday March 10, 2014 at the Divine Love Retreat and Conference Centre (DRACC) Lugbe – Abuja.

Preceding the day of the reports presentation (precisely on Sunday April 9th 2014) was the opening Mass of the Bishops Conference at the our Lady Queen Nigeria Pro -Cathedral Garki - Abuja. The Mass was concelebrated by the chief celebrant His Grace Most Rev Dr Ignatius A. Kaigama the Archbishop of Jos and President of the conference flanked by His Grace Most Rev Dr Anthony J.V Obinna, the Archbishop of Owerri and His Grace Most Rev Dr Valerian Maduka Okeke, the Archbishop of Onitsha with the Papal Nuncio to Nigeria. His Grace Most Rev Dr Augustine Kassuja His Eminence John Cardinal Onaiyekan the Archbishop of Abuja and over 60 Bishops (both serving and retired) in attendance.

The Senate President, Senator David Bonaventure Mark was in attendance.

The Supreme Subordinate President Major General Anslem Okafor and his Auxiliary counterpart Noble Lady Viola A. Onwuliri who is equally the Minister of State 1 Foreign Affairs were in attendance with large numbers of Brothers and Sisters.

The Conference theme was "Church and State partnership in providing quality education for the Nigeria people". The Homily was delivered by Cardinal Onaiyekan

After the Mass, the activities shifted to the Pro – Cathedral Hall where the conference was formally declared open by the President of the Catholic Bishops Conference of Nigeria (CBCN) His Grace Most Rev. Dr. Ignatius Kaigama.

The President of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, His Excellency, Dr Goodluck Ebele Jonathan was physically present at the opening ceremony: Goodwill messages were



received from the Papal Nuncio; the Archbishop of Abuja, Senate President and the President of the Federation.

The President Dr Goodluck Ebele Jonathan appreciated the conference theme, extolled the efforts of Nigeria Bishops in ensuring peace in the Country. He said education builds and edifies a Nation. He said though not a Catholic but he is a product of Catholic education. He asked everybody to pray for the unity and survival of Nigeria.

Monday March 10, 2014

Back to the events of reports presentation on Monday March 10, 2014 was presentation of papers on the conference theme. The Chairman of the session was His Excellency Most Rev. Dr. Godfrey Onah, the Bishop of Nsukka Diocese.

Papers were presented by four Eminent scholars including the Governor of Benue State His Excellency Rt. Hon Gabriel Torwua Suswan, Professor Armstrong Matia Adejo Dean of students Benue University Makurdi, Rev. Dr. Maria Chijoke Nwankwo IHM, Principal Queen of Rosary College Onitsha and Prof. Emeka Ezeonu of Nnamdi Azikiwe University Awka.

There was tea break after this session.

The next session was annual (2013) reports to the Conference by Church Organi stations at the national level. Knight of St John International Nigeria report was presented by the Supreme Subordinate President Major General Anslem

Okafor assisted by the Supreme Subordinate Auxilliary President Noble Sister Viola Onwliri Hitherto to our report presentation, the Bishops Conference assigned to KSJI Nigeria, the building of a two storeyed classroom block at the Catholic University – Veritas University of Nigeria Abuja (VUNA) costing N140 Million Naira (\$829, 383).

At the February 2013 report presentation Major General Anslem Okafor did promise the Nigerian Bishops that he would hand over the key of the finished project to them at the 2014 Conference.

Hear the words of the Supreme Subordinate President - "when I presented my report last year 2013), I reassured your Excellencies that KSJI was in the planning stage for carrying out the construction of a classroom block at Veritas University as assigned to us by the Bishops. I said that once the planning was completed KSJI would embark on the project and would not stop until the job was done. KSJI operates like the well known bamboo tree. Once planted the bamboo tree takes a staggering four years, about 1,460 days, to develop its roots without even showing up the ground, but on the fifth year the mystery tree burst through the soil and grows to an impressive height of twenty feet within the first six weeks of the fifth year, to the delight of the patient farmer. Our planning for the project took time.

# **Silent Evangelization**

It was St Francis of Assisi, the Founder of the mendicant Order of the Franciscans in the 13th century who sent his followers out with instructions: "Go and preach the Gospel; use words if necessary". By this, St Francis meant that his disciples should live out the Gospel by their lives. Their lives should mirror the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Example, he held, was better than precept. This was silent evangelization. Or as is popularly held - actions speak louder than words. So, St Francis and his followers took the vow of poverty - and walked without shoes or socks throughout Europe preaching the Gospel. They were known as "cappuccini scalzi" - preachers without socks. Their preaching brought great revival in Europe, as many persons abandoned the life of opulence and embraced the poor, the downtrodden, and the "dannati della terra".

In the New Evangelization of Vatican II, emphasis is on action not words, as is evidenced by the words of the bishop during the ordination of new Catholic priests – "preach what you believe in and live out what you preach".

Our Pope, a Franciscan not just in name but in the Spirit, told the youths on World Youth Day, Feb6, 2014: "Evangelization in our time will only take place as a result of contagious joy". And this joy comes from living the life of Christ, being poor in the Spirit. He has instructed priests to shun lives of opulence and ostentation – big cars, big houses, expensive shoes etc. and embrace lives simplicity for the sale of Christ. "There is a close connection between poverty and evangelization" The Supreme Pontiff remarked.

### **Spectacular Evangelization**

In contrast to this silent evangelization, is spectacular and miraculous evangelization which is the modus operandi among the new churches and Pentecostals in Nigeria.

Day in and day out, we are bombarded by announcements crusades,

church programmes featuring revivals, breakthroughs, great healings, and miracles. Walking down any Street in Nigeria, one encounters blasts of megaphones, with loudspeakers blaring into the streets, assaulting everyone who passes by preaching spurious gospel massages and claiming fantastic healings, breakthroughs.

This is counterfeit evangelization. Jesus Christ never advertised miracles. In St John's Gospels, the evangelist never spoke of miracles rather he called these miracles signs - pointing to himself and to his Father who sent him.

# Ocular Evangelization in Kaiama, March 16<sup>th</sup>, 2014.

In Port Harcourt Grand Commandery, we use ocular evangelization, which is a version of silent evangelization.

We use this method to penetrate our territory and win souls for Christ. And this is what we did in the city of Kaiama, Bayelsa State on March 16, 2014.

Kaiama is an ancient town situated on the western bank of River Nun. It was first evangelized by Anglican missionaries who established schools and churches in the region in the nineteenth century. The city became a center for learning throughout the South-South region and has produced famous intellectuals and radicals. Major Isaac Boro, hails from this land.

The Catholic faith was late in coming, and to date, Catholic families may be numbered off in the fingers of the hand.

But, the city has Brig. Gen. George Ikioumoton, who is on fire for the evangelization of his home town. The brothers and sisters, who came for the inauguration of St Joseph's Commandery #806, were shocked to find that the only existing Catholic Church was not big enough to accommodate half of the brethren in attendance. The other half, and the indigenous worshippers, stayed in tarpuline outside the Church.

Even this little Church building was marked for demolition by the men of SETRACO Construction Company working on the East-West Road!


# Initiation of 28 New Brothers into the Knighthood

# Update of Activities, May, 2014

Abuja Grand Commandery now has 2 Regiments, 6 District Commanderies, 18 Local Commanderies, and 4 Cadet Commanderies.

A new Commandery was inaugurated on 7<sup>th</sup> of September 2013; Commandery 805, St John of the Cross, Mararaba.

### **Initiations:**

Two initiations were held in April and December 2013 respectively. A total of 87 new brothers were initiated.

### JGBOT:

The Abuja JGBOT meeting in the month of February was held on the 1<sup>st</sup> of February 2014, at KSJI Hall, Our Lady Queen of Nigeria, Garki, Abuja.

# Joint Supreme Subordinate Board Meeting:

The Joint Supreme Subordinate Board meeting was hosted by Abuja Grand on the 28th of February, 2014. A highlight of the meeting was a visit to VUNA, where the Supreme Subordinate President, Maj. Gen. AnslemOkafor promised to hand over the keys of VUNA at the Bishops conference.

### **CBCN Conference:**

The CBCN plenary session took place Sunday March 9th and Friday, March 14th 2014. On Monday March 10 2014, the report of KSJI was jointly presented by the Supreme Subordinate President Maj. Gen. Anselm Okafor, and Supreme Subordinate Auxillary President Noble Sister Prof. Viola Onwuliri. They restated the commitment of the administration towards selfless service of the knighthood and the church. The climax of the presentation was the fulfillment of a promise to the CBCN last year by the Supreme Subordinate President to deliver within one year the completed block of 10 classrooms allocated to KSJI. He presented an envelope containing the keys to the completed building and was greeted by a rousing ovation from the crowd. Also a cheque of five hundred thousand naira as agreed and several packs of KSJI branded bottle water were presented to be served to the bishops throughout the conference.

# Daily Massed for Safe Return of Chibok Girls:

Every local Commandery and LAUX of the Abuja Grand has been booking daily Masses for the safe return of over 200 Chibok female students abducted by Boko Haram. Members also engaged in an 8 day novena prayer and fast which ended with a High Mass. A press conference was also held regarding the concern and efforts of the Abuja Grand towards the missing girls.

### Visit to Victims of Nyanya Bomb Blast:

A visit was paid by the Abuja Grand Commandery and Abuja LAUX to the victims of the Nyanya bomb blast that occurred on the 7th of April, 2014. The visit took place on the 23rd of April 2014 and gift items were donated to the victims in cash and kind. Blood donations were also made. The turn up was quite impressive as brothers and sisters turned out en masse to offer their support to the victims. We were received by FCT officials who expressed gratitude for the visit. Prayers were said at the bedside of victims and the Grand President promised further assistance, especial to the female victims of the blast

## Problems/Challenges:

Venues for meetings continue to be a challenge as not many rooms are available in the different parishes where the Commanderies meet.

### **Achievements:**

- i. Peace and harmony has continued to exist within the diocese as members of different groups continue to participate in all diocesan events.
- ii. Abuja Grand played a lead role in the Veritas University of Nigeria, Abuja project. Several contributions were made towards the project, with regular visits paid by key officers of Abuja Grand and updates accordingly transmitted to the Supreme Subordinate Commandery as part of their supervisory role towards the project. This project has now been completed and the block of classrooms is to be handed over to the church.
- iii. Abuja Grand played the lead role during the visit of the Supreme Officers to West Africa. The officers

visited Abuja zone which comprised of Jos, Abuja Kaduna and Makurdi Grand Commanderies and Abuja Grand played host to the visitors with lunch and breakfast sponsored by Brig. Gen Dan Okekenta and Maj. Gen. NNN Nwanesi respectively and yet a third breakfast at the Catholic Secretariat of Nigeria partly sponsored by Abuja Grand Commandery and LAUX and the host, Very Rev. The St. Albert the Great Major Seminary is primarily for the Lagos, Ibadan and Benin Ecclesiastical Provinces, which is located at Idowu Ofanron, in the Dioceses of Abeokuta within the Lagos Ecclesiastical Province.

Giving justification for the involvement of Lagos Grand in this laudable project, Gen. Patrick Igwilo emphasized that "since the Church is always in need of more Priests to continue the work of evangelization in the world of our time, it behoves on us as Knights of the Church to enthusiastically contribute in any way that we can towards the growth of the faith".

The block of classrooms which costs N34,600,000 (\$200,000) for



building, equipping and furnishing is billed to be completed by the end of May 2014.

While thanking brothers and sisters of the Lagos Grand Commandery and Ladies Auxiliary for the laudable effort, His Grace Alfred Adewale Martins gave rationale for the St. Albert the Great Seminary; "no doubt, in order to have a good formation, you require at the most four hundred persons in the seminary. But with the two Major Seminaries currently serving the three provinces at Ibadan and Uhiele-Ekpoma, being heavily populated with 500 and 400 students respectively; which situation has led to rationing the admission of seminarians from the contributing Provinces, the concept of St. Albert the Great became critically essential. It is hoped that this will help decongest the existing ones to a more manageable size and allow increase in vocation to match the existing great need for evangelization both within and outside the country".

The Seminary is named after St. Albert the Great, who himself was known as the "teacher of everything there is to know". He was a specialist in the field of knowledge, and a scientist long before the age of science.


# Enugu Grand Commandery

In addition to Stations of the Cross, confessions, and prayers, three spiritual talks were delivered including: (1.) Emptiness of Man and the Challenges of our Faith by Col. C.A. Nwokocha, Grand First Vice President, Enugu Grand Commandery and Chairman of the 2014 Lenten Retreat Planning Committee; (2.) Safeguarding our Catholic Identity, by Rev. Fr. Hillary Okey Ocho; (3.) Living in Conscience and Integrity, by Rev.Fr. Sylvester Ejike Ozioko, and (4) Reflections on Living out Our faith as Knights by Rev Sister Cecilia Eze

The retreat commenced at 4.30pm with Rosary led by the Grand 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President Col. C.A. Nwokocha, followed by Stations of the Cross officiated by the coordinating priest for the retreat Rev. Fr. Jude Odo with the Grand Secretary Col. Innocent Diyoke as reader.

In his homily during the opening Mass the Rev. Fr. Jude charged the nights to love as God loves. In



another development, Brig. Gen. P.S. Nwajagu in his keynote address reminded the Knights of the retreat objectives which were to take stock of our Grand activities after intensive prayers and meditation, look at our successes and failures and use the lessons learned to improve and move our order forward. He charged

the participants to learn to share and make marks with which to be remembered.

Presenting his welcome address, the Chairman of the retreat planning committee, Col. C. A. Nwokocha highlighted the emptiness of man and the challenges of our faith emphasizing that without Jesus we can do nothing. He charged all to shun acquisitive tendencies and remember that Jesus is the way, the truth and the life, no man comes to the father except through Jesus (John14:6).

# Rev. Fr. Hillary Okey Ocho spoke on safe guarding our Catholic Identity.

He discussed the origin of the Knighthood to Knights in our age; safeguarding our Catholic Identity; Sense of Scramentality; Reverence for the Scripture and Tradition; Obedience to Church Authority; Respect for Human life; and Fidelity to the Gospel. In his conclusion, he averred that among the lay faithful, Knights are "guards" of the Catholic faith, hence, they should always be seen active at their duty posts.

He traced the origins of the Knight, gave an overview of a knight

in ancient history, Ancient Rome, down to the medieval era, through the period of the rise of Muslim incursions and the crusades. He identified the knights of Malta or Knights Hospitallers Order of St. John of Jerusalem' as the first known, brave and faith filled men who were recruited to defend Christian communities and pilgrims from attack by the Muslims. He further discussed Knights in our Age who he said were entrusted with communicating and safeguarding the Catholic faith. He charged the KSJI to live out and defend Catholic doctrine. To strive to live the gospel for our own sanctification and as an example to others.

To bear true witness which involves an intra-waged warfare whereby we aim to subdue the flesh to be obedient to the spirit. KSJI should wear the Catholic identify as badges at all times. We have a sense of sacramentality and knowledge of the sacrament and sacramental, and love and revere the sacraments.

He asked whether as knights of the church we still believe in the inspiration, inerrancy and orthodox interpretation of the Bible or has the Pentecostal wave swept off our feet. Reverence for the Scripture and Tradition (Sacred Tradition and the Magisterium). In his conclusion, he charged the knights to let our lives reflect that which our titles and attire represent. The Catholic identify should be badges on our souls. We should always be seen active at our duty posts.

# Rev. Fr. Sylvester Ejike Ozioko gave his talk on Living in Conscience and Integrity...... The Example of St. Thomas More.

The centre piece of Rev Fr. Ozioko talk was Living in Conscience and Integrity, the example of St. Thomas More. He discussed the two concepts of conscience and integrity; integrity as standing for something and lessons for Knights and Ladies. In his conclusion, he quoted from J.G. Holland. We pray God to give us men.

...Men whom the spoils of office cannot buy, etc. He started his discussion with the following basic



questions: who are you, in the end? What, if anything, defines you? What is it that makes you you? Is there anything in you that is not transitory, not hostage to circumstance, not subject to renegotiation or comprise? Is there anything, for instance, that you could never, over bring yourself to do, regardless of the price, or whatever pressure might be brought to bear upon you?

He opined that a person of integrity will always standout for something, may be in defence of truth, justice and other universals. A man of integrity, like St. Thomas More, will follow his conscience- despite the cost; will always do things that others do not understand. He said the lesson for knights is to emulate St. Thomas More and our patron, John the Baptist who are models of integrity by standing for something always. John the Baptist died in defence of truth.

A successful first degree initiation into the Order was carried out by Enugu Grand Commandery from Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> April to Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> April 2014. 54 aspirants were initiated, 50 as active members and 4 as social members. 49 of these new

I will dwell on the ranking of non-commissioned officers and the Service Stripes and Crosses only. I would like to call on all Local Commanders in Nigeria to go to



the Supreme Constitution Chapter VI Section 36:

It shall be the duty of the Commander to order and command at all drills and parades. The Commander shall appoint all non-commissioned officers not to exceed five Sergeants and eight Corporals, and see that the rules governing the military department are strictly enforced. He shall obey all orders and commands of superior officers in the District, Grand and Supreme Commanderies.

With this provision, they should establish military departments in their Local Commanderies.



It has become necessary I shall make a special request from the Supreme Subordinate President Nigeria Major General A.I. Okafor and Supreme Subordinate Inspector General Noble Brother Eugene Emenalo to have a session with all the Local Commanders in Nigeria to guide on the roles and functions of Military Departments in Local Commanderies. This session is important as it will also clarify many issues as regards the offices of President and Commander of the Local Commandery.

Meanwhile I would like to once again display the non-commissioned ranks as sent to me by the Assistant Editor Knights Journal Brigadier General James Schafhausen whose efforts made it possible for me to get the chart of the KSJI Ranks, courtesy, the Supreme Inspector General Captain James Gibbons. If our Local Commanders will establish the military departments and award Service Stripes to deserving officers, we shall have less agitation of brothers looking for commissioned ranks. # **Crises in Benue State Affecting Makurdi Grand Commandery Members**

It is rather unfortunate to report that there had been a lot of killings in Benue State just as it is in other parts of Nigeria but the issue in Benue State is not the Boko Haram which is associated with insurgency in the Northern part of the Country. Although we have not received report of any brother bring directly attacked but there is clear evidence of their relatives been killed, injured or chased away. It has become unbearable for most members of the Grand Commandery as their homes have been turned into Refugee Camps hosting those who have been chased away from their original homes due to the invasion of suspected Fulani herdsmen. The secu-

rity situation has caused a lot of hardships for some family members of our brothers who carter for so many refugees who have fled from their original homes to Makurdi town mostly for safety as most of them watched their houses burnt and crops destroyed. We need prayers of all towards this ugly situation. The Grand President Brigadier General Simon Aondona has directed District Commanders to mobilize relieve materials to be presented to the various refugee camps across the Grand Commandery catchment area. The crises affect people in the catchment areas of the Grand Commandery in Districts 40 Makurdi, 41 Otukpo and 42 Gboko respectively.
